

With the support of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the MacColl Center's Dr. Michael Parchman has been working to curb medical overuse, including leading a <u>fellowship for Value Champions</u>—change agents who optimize medical care to do less of what potentially harms and more of what truly helps patients. Most recently, Dr. Parchman partnered with colleagues from America's Essential Hospitals to develop a 3-part Value Champions webinar series aimed at tackling this important issue in safety net settings.

- <u>Overuse and Impact on Equity</u>: Provides a 'deep dive' on the concept of value within safety net settings and examines the impact of delivering services for which potential for harm exceeds benefit on health equity.
- <u>Engaging Stakeholders to Reduce Overuse</u>: Describes how to identify and engage your organization's stakeholders in reducing the use of services with a case study of one value champion's efforts to do so in a hospital setting.
- Including Patient Voices and Perspectives: Explores how incorporating patient voices into overuse reduction efforts is a critical step to decreasing unnecessary services and provides an example of how a value champion in an essential hospital did so.


Join our team: Career opportunity for a collaborative scientist with expertise in social health

New resource for mapping racial & ethnic inequities in health

If you haven't yet seen it, check out this cool <u>new tool for</u> <u>mapping racial and ethnic</u> <u>inequities</u> in health and opportunity. Made available by the



New England Journal of Medicine, this interactive resource provides helpful data on social health factors like access to primary care, adult health status, affordable housing, food security, and livable income. Using a clickable map that aggregates data from the Health Opportunity and Equity (HOPE) Initiative, readers can view and compare a range of indicators for each state and for six racial and ethnic groups.

Call for applications from the Virtual Care Innovation Network

Here is an exciting opportunity for safety net organizations in the 9 states were Kaiser Permanente provides care (see list at right). The Virtual Care Innovation Network (VCIN) is supporting an effort to redesign care so that virtual care models continue after the COVID-19 pandemic abates and beyond. This unique program will bring together safety net leaders to solve similar challenges associated with virtual care implementation, improvement, and sustainability. The VCIN is funded by Kaiser Permanente and designed in partnership with Center for Care Innovations, National Health Care for the Homeless Council, and primary care associations in each of the states in which Kaiser Permanente provides care. Learn more about how to apply on the <u>VCIN website</u>. The program will run from March 2021 to May 31, 2022. Applications are due January 13, 2021.


